# Make a plan.

Prepare yourself and your family in case you are detained.

# **HOW TO PREPARE**

IT IS IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND WHETHER YOU HAVE IMMIGRATION STATUS OR NOT. GET A LEGAL CONSULTATION!

- Find out your immigration status.
- **Get a lawyer** and carry his/her phone number with you.
- **Know your rights** in case an officer asks you questions or comes to your home.
- Memorize phone numbers of family members and emergency contacts.
- Make a plan for your children and family in case you are detained. Complete a 'Family Preparedness Plan.'

# **GOOD TO KNOW**

IMMIGRATION LAW IS COMPLICATED.
THERE IS A LOT OF MISINFORMATION
IN THE COMMUNITY.

SPEAK WITH AN EXPERIENCED
IMMIGRATION ATTORNEY WHO
KNOWS THE LAW. YOU MAY BE
ELIGIBLE FOR OTHER FORMS OF
RELIEF. IF YOU HAVE NOT ALREADY,
CONSULT WITH A LAWYER.

- U.S. citizens can **never** be deported.
- Immigration status can be lost if you commit certain crimes or violate it.
- To detain you and to start deportation proceedings against you, Immigration & Customs Enforcement (ICE) needs information about your place of birth and country of citizenship.
- Do NOT carry documents that indicate your place of birth. Do NOT carry around your passport.
- Having a child born in the U.S. does not give you immigration status.
- If law enforcement is asking for your permission, that means they need it!

# **Assert your rights.**

Invoke your rights out loud, in the language you feel the most comfortable.

#### YOUR RIGHTS AT HOME

REFUSE ENTRY AND SEARCH OF YOUR HOME.

**REMAIN SILENT.** 

REFUSE TO GIVE INFO
ABOUT YOUR IMMIGRATION
OR CRIMINAL HISTORY.

NOT TO SIGN ANYTHING.

#### If ICE is at your door:

- **DO NOT** open the door. You have the right to refuse entry. Slide your 'Know Your Rights' card under the door. You have the right to remain silent.
- You **DO NOT** have to let ICE into your home without a warrant signed by an immigration judge. ICE may use lies, tricks, and intimidation to get your permission to enter your home.
- Ask ICE to slide the warrant under the door. The warrant must have your name and address, and it must be signed by an immigration judge.
- Call an attorney as soon as possible. If you do not have one, get a lawyer. **DO NOT** sign anything without consulting a lawyer.

### YOUR RIGHTS OUTSIDE YOUR HOME

REMAIN SILENT.

ASK IF YOU MAY LEAVE.

MAKE A PHONE CALL.

#### If you encounter ICE outside your home:

- Stay calm. Do not run or resist arrest. Keep your hands in plain view. Do not get upset or agitated.
- Ask if you are under arrest or free to leave. If you are not under arrest, **ask to leave.**
- You **do not have to answer any questions** about your immigration or criminal history. You have the **right to remain silent.** Say, "I want to remain silent."
- Do not give a false name or false information.
- Ask to call a lawyer. You have the right to make a phone call.

# Contact a lawyer.

Speak with an accredited and experienced immigration attorney who knows the law.

### IF YOU ARE IN DEPORTATION PROCEEDINGS

- If you have a court date, **go to court!** You do not need a lawyer at your first court date.
- If you do not go to court, you will be ordered to be deported for failing to appear.
- An outstanding deportation order can make you more vulnerable to ICE.
- You may also be required to check-in with ICE during your deportation proceedings. **Go to your check-in appointments.**

#### **AVOID SCAMS**

BE SURE THE PERSON ASSISTING YOU IS **AUTHORIZED TO GIVE LEGAL ADVICE.**  A 'notario publico' is not authorized to provide legal services. Only an attorney or an accredited representative at a **Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA)** recognized organization can give you legal advice.

# NO INFO "I don't want to talk to you."

- •You have the right to remain silent.
- Do not give information about your immigration or criminal history.
- Do not sign anything without a lawyer.

# NO ENTRY "I don't want you in my home."

- •You have the right to refuse entry into your home.
- Do not open the door to ICE. ICE must have a warrant signed by an immigration judge with your specific name to enter your home.

# NO SEARCH "I don't want you to search."

- •You have the right to refuse a search of your home.
- •Slide your 'Know Your Rights' card under the door.

Immigrants with status, pending status, and who are undocumented have constitutional rights. It is important to know your rights and to **be comfortable asserting these rights** so that you can be protected.
